



Getting Started...

Your First Six Daisy Meetings

Each time your troop meets, you should have a plan for what will happen at the meeting. There are six parts of a troop meeting, Pre-meeting Activity, Opening, Troop Business (also called Talk Time for Daisy Girl Scouts), Activity Time, Clean Up, and Closing.

These six meeting plans are *suggestions* to help you to develop a routine with your girls. Adapt them to meet the needs and interests of the girls in your troop.

After reviewing all of your resources; *The Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book*, *The Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders* and *Safety Wise* and completing both sessions of Basic Leadership Training, you can try out some of the ideas from the printed resources, your trainers and other leaders in your training session. Feel free to substitute these ideas and activities for those listed in these meeting plans.

Girl/adult partnerships in Girl Scouting are the key to our success. So, after your troop settles into a routine, girls should be involved in the planning of their meetings and activities. Even the youngest Daisy Girl Scout will have an idea of what she would like to learn and do after participating in a few planned meetings and having a chance to look at *the Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book*.

Most troops have a parent meeting prior to their first troop meeting. At this time you can discuss expectations – theirs and yours regarding such things as help with troop meetings, family participation, chaperoning field trips, how girls will get to and from meetings, transportation for field trips, uniforms, handbooks, troop dues and when and where the troop will meet. It is a good time to let families know that the troop can do more and achieve more if everyone helps out.

Some troops have a snack at each meeting. For girls whose troops meet in the evening after supper, snacks might be only an occasional thing. For girls whose troops meet right after school, you might plan to have a snack when they arrive at each meeting. Be sure to allow time for this in your meeting plans. Some troops rotate who brings the snacks by sending a specially marked container home with the girls whose turn it will be. Others add in an extra 25 cents per meeting to the dues to cover the cost of snacks. Discuss this at your parent meeting. Be sure when planning snacks for your troop to check the girls' health histories (found on the reverse side of the girl registration form) to determine if anyone has food allergies such as peanuts or chocolate. If this is the case, please remind everyone that these are items are off limits at your troop meetings.

Remember that you are not alone. You have many people who can help you – members of your service team who you will get to know at service unit meetings, your field executive, and many other staff and volunteers in our Girl Scout Council.

Welcome to Girl Scouting! An extraordinary adventure awaits you!

Some Tips for Successful Meetings

- Be Prepared! Read through each meeting plan and gather the supplies you need for the meeting a day or two ahead of time. Bring a few extras – you might have a few new girls join your troop.
- Familiarize yourself with the resource books. Daisy Leaders need: *The Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders, The Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book and Safety Wise.*
- Sit down with your co-leader and decide who will lead which parts of the meeting.
- Be early! Especially for your first meeting. This way, you can set up the meeting space in an arrangement that will be best for you.
- Greet each girl as she comes in – it will reassure her that you are glad she’s here. It will also help you to learn all of the names, and help them to get to know you, too.
- Smile and be friendly to everyone. If parents ask you questions you cannot answer yet, tell them you will find out and get back to them. (Be sure you do!)
- Have a few “tricks” up your sleeve, just in case you finish something quicker than you planned. Check the *Amazing Daisy Activities* chapter of *The Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders* for ideas.
- Use the Daisy Girl Scout circle to make formal decisions about activities. A circle should last no more than 15 minutes for girls of this age.
- Use an “It Bag” and an “Other Bag” to choose who gets to do things in a fair way. You need two lunch size bags (colored or decorated that say IT and OTHER). Inside you place a craft stick or cardboard shape with each girl’s name printed on it. When you need someone to do a task, select one from the it bag. After you read the name, put it in the other bag. Use all of the names in the It bag (it may take you three or four meetings to do so.) When there are no more names in the it bag, empty the other bag back into the it bag and start over.
- Ask girls to share ideas, listen to each other, and make troop decisions by consensus or voting.
- You can also present a list of ideas, have girls rank or choose among them, and help girls follow through on their decisions.
- Help girls understand that sometimes things don’t turn out the way we expect and learning from mistakes can be a valuable experience.

FIRST MEETING

Pre Meeting Activity

Greet each girl. As they arrive and are shown where to hang their coats, where the bathroom is and where your Daisy Circle will be.

Have girls decorate a paper bracelet (precut 2" x 6" strips of paper, provide markers or crayons). When they are finished, tape it closed over their right wrist.

Opening

When all of the Girl Scouts have arrived, have them sit in the Daisy Circle. Explain to the girls that this is their Daisy Circle and it is where they will go each week to learn more about being a Daisy, a Girl Scout, and a member of a troop. You will also discuss Daisy troop activities in the Daisy Circle.

Give each Daisy a "Good Deed" daisy as her nametag. (Make these ahead of time – cut these out of white paper into the shape of a daisy flower. (Approximately 5 – 6 inches in diameter.) Use a marker to color the center yellow or add yellow construction paper.) Explain that a good deed is something that is her idea...something nice she does for someone without being asked. Ask girls for examples of what kinds of things they can do that would be good deeds. During the week, as the Daisy completes a good deed, she should ask someone in her family to write it down on one of the petals of her Good Deed Daisy. Then she should bring it back to the second meeting.

Troop Business/Talk Time

It is time to get acquainted. Introduce yourself. Explain to them that the adults their Daisy Girl Scout Leaders. Girl Scout leaders are adult friends. Talk about how to treat adults with respect.

Introduce the "It" bag and the "Other bag. Explain that it is a fair way to choose. Let the girls know that the it bag will determine who gets to be "it" for games, who cleans up, and who gets to pass out supplies.

Have a small trashcan and roll of toilet paper with you. Pass the toilet paper around and tell each Daisy to take as much toilet paper as she will need (do not tell them what they need it for). When everyone has a length of toilet paper, explain that you tear off one piece of toilet paper and place it in the trashcan. For every piece of toilet paper, each Daisy must tell the group one thing about herself (her name, birthday, school, pets, favorite color etc.) Go first to demonstrate how they can tell the group about themselves.

Tell the group about the Daisy Center and Petals. Explain to them that they will be earning the Center as soon as they learn the Girl Scout Promise and that during the year; they earn the Petals by learning about the Girl Scout Law.

You may also show the girls a Daisy Pin and tell them that they will receive their Daisy Pins at a ceremony to be held after they have learned the Girl Scout Promise.

Activity Time

At this meeting, you will focus on the traditions of Daisy Girl Scouting, the Girl Scout Sign, Girl Scout Promise, the Daisy Girl Scout Story, the Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book and the Daisy Girl Scout Poem.

GIRL SCOUT PROMISE and GIRL SCOUT SIGN

Teach the girls the Girl Scout Sign that is made when you say the Girl Scout Promise. You use the middle three fingers and hold down your pinkie with your thumb on your right hand (the one with the bracelet). This makes the Girl Scout Sign. Then say the promise. Have the girls repeat the Promise line by line as you say it. Then, explain the Promise. "On my honor" means that I am always telling the truth when I say my Promise. "I will try" means that I may not always be perfect but I will always try to do my best. "To serve God and my country" means that I will be

the best person and the best citizen that I can be by being good to my family and my community. "To help people at all times" means to be helpful and to look for ways to help other people. "And to live by the Girl Scout Law" is a big thing and it will take all year to learn how to live by the Girl Scout law. Then read the Girl Scout Law so they hear the words of the law.

WHY WE ARE DAISY GIRL SCOUTS

Read the Juliette Low Story. This will help the girls learn about Juliette Low and why the word Daisy is important to Girl Scouts. Use the Juliette Low story with actions on the next page.

DAISY ACTIVITY BOOK

Show the girls the Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book where to find the Girl Scout Promise and the Girl Scout Law. Sitting in the Daisy Circle, the troop can do page 8 as a way for the girls to learn each other's names. Give each Daisy a marker or crayon. Then give each Daisy her own activity book and ask them to open to page 8. Have each Daisy write her own name on the top line. Then have every Daisy give her book to the Daisy on her right. Again, each Daisy print her own name.

When they are done, again, have each Daisy give that book to the Daisy on her right. This continues until every Daisy has signed every book and has gotten her own book back.

DAISY POEM

Teach the girls the Daisy Poem. Demonstrate the movements as you have them repeat line by line:

I'm a Daisy standing tall (stand up)
I'm a Daisy, friend to all (waves to her new Daisy friends)
I'm a Daisy, growing every day (reaches up high)
Living my life the Girl Scout way (make the Girl Scout Sign with right hand)

DAISY OVER THE WATER GAME

Stand in a circle. One girl is chosen as Daisy (or a leader can take the first turn). Daisy stands in the center of the circle. The others walk, skip, or hop around the circle chanting:

**Daisy over the water,
Daisy over the sea,
Daisy caught a seagull,
But she can't catch me!**

As "me" is said, the children stoop quickly. Daisy tries to tag as many as he can before they are in a squatting position. Daisy is allowed three turns then chooses someone she tagged to take her place.

Clean Up

Pass around the trashcan to collect any trash. Have girls put their markers in the marker box and put away all of their supplies. Have the girls repeat after you. "A Girl Scout leaves a place better than she found it."

Closing

Many troops end each meeting with a Friendship Circle. Have each Daisy stand and cross her right hand (the one with the bracelet) over her left. Then hold the hand on each girl next to her. The leader begins by making a wish and then squeezing the hand of the Daisy on her left. This goes all around the circle until the Daisy on the leader's right completes the circle by making her wish and squeezing the leader's hand.

THE STORY OF JULIETTE LOW

-Action story

This will help you introduce Juliette Low to the girls and can also be done with the families as part of a Daisy Investiture.

DIVIDE GROUP INTO SMALLER GROUPS:

These will be: Little Girls, Juliette Low, Georgia, Horses, London, Lord Baden-Powell, and Girl Scouts. For a small group, give each girl a "word" to listen for and act out.

SOUND EFFECTS:

DAISY.....(everyone) ...raises both hands and says: "That's Me!"

LITTLE GIRLS.....stand and giggle

JULIETTE LOW.....Curtsey and say" Be My Friend"

HORSES.....Say "Neighhh"

LORD BADEN-POWELL..... Bow Formally and say "How do u do?"

LONDON.....Sing "London Bridges Falling Down"

GIRL SCOUTS..... Make Scout sign, say "Be Prepared"

Once upon a time there was a **little girl** named **Juliette Low**.

When she was just a baby, her uncle said she was going to be a **daisy!** He knew she was special, so from then on, everyone called her **Daisy**. She loved animals so much that once she saved a kitten from drowning in a flood. Another time, she placed her mother's quilt over a cow so it wouldn't get cold in the middle of the night. **Daisy** through the cow needed the quilt to keep warm, but it really didn't. It was find in the stable. **Daisy** had animals around her whenever she could. She had dogs, birds, and other animals as pets throughout her life. She especially liked to ride **horses**.

Juliette Low visited **London** where she kept learning new things and meeting new people She met **Lord Baden-Powell** and his sister Agnes. They told her about the Boy Scouts and the Girl Guides they had started. So **Juliette Low** said good-bye to **London** and came home to Georgia with the idea that **Lord Baden-Powell** gave her. **Daisy** decided to start troops for girls in the United States. On March 12, 1912, she started the first troop in Savannah, Georgia. She formed a group of **little girls**, who liked to be together and ride **horses**, into a troop of **Girl Scouts**.

And the girls loved it so much that the idea spread and now there are **little girls** in troops of **Girl Scouts** all over the world.

SECOND MEETING

Pre-Meeting Activity

Begin in the Daisy Girl Scout Circle. Each Daisy arrives, puts away her coat and joins the Daisy Circle.

Me in Paper (page 10 of the Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders). Precut sheets of paper large enough for a Daisy Girl Scout to trace her body onto (one for each girl). Spread the paper on to the floor. One girl lies face up on the paper. The other girl traces an outline around the girl with a crayon. Print each girl's name on top of her paper. Roll each one up until next week..

Opening

In the Daisy Circle, make the Girl Scout sign and say the Girl Scout Promise.

Troop Business/ Talk Time

Have each Daisy hold up her Good Deed Daisy and then tell the troop about her good deeds. Hold each one up for all to see. Pin it back on the girl to use as a nametag. (If they are in good shape, take them home and laminate them or cover them with clear contact paper to make permanent nametags.) At the end, reward everyone's good deeds with applause, or a sticker.

Tell the girls a little more about other age levels. Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes and Seniors. You might want to have pictures (from the Girl Scout Equipment Catalog) to show the girls in your troop what the older Girl Scouts look like in their uniforms.

Activity Time

Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book Pages 3,4, and 5.

Have each Daisy tells you more about herself. Have each Daisy print her own name. Ask each girl the date of her birthday and write that in as well. Give the girls more markers or crayons and have them draw something for their favorite color, food, hobby, song and story. To complete page have each Daisy think of a creative way to write her name using her favorite things (favorite color, shapes, flowers, etc.) To complete the activity on page 5, each girl can draw herself. Talk to the troop about how each girl is the same (they all have noses, mouths, etc.) and yet different (hair style, choice in clothing etc.)

(Note: If girls do not have the Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book, the same type of activities can be done on paper and assembled into a Daisy Girl Scout scrap book.

DAISY-TO-DAISY GAME:

Have the girls pair off, with one person as the "caller". The caller shouts out different body parts that the partners must match by touching. (i.e. "elbow to elbow") the partners would touch each other's elbows. Then the caller might call out "toe to toe". When the caller shouts of Daisy to Daisy, everyone runs to find a new partner.

MAKE NEW FRIENDS

Teach the girls the song that is sung by Girl Scouts of all ages This traditional Girl Scout song can be found in the Girl Scout Pocket Song Book, Sing Together, and also on other Girl Scout cassettes, and CD's. (If you don't know Make New Friends. More songs can be found in this packet after meeting four.)

Make new friends and keep the old, One is silver and the other's gold

Clean up

Pass around the trashcan to collect any trash and put away all of their supplies. Have the girls repeat after you. "A Girl Scout leaves a place better than she found it."

Closing

End the meeting with a friendship circle.

THIRD MEETING

Pre-Meeting Activity

Each Daisy arrives, puts away her coat and joins the Daisy Circle.

Me in Paper (page 10 of the Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders). Have each girl decorate her "body" by putting in as many details as possible – eyes, nose, mouth, hair, skin, clothes, etc. Roll them up and put them away until next week.

Opening

Make the Girl Scout sign and repeat the Girl Scout Promise.

Troop Business/Talk Time

Have the girls sit in a circle. Allow the girls an opportunity to share happenings from the previous week (what "good deeds" were done, birthday's, school news, etc.) Introduce something new: give each girl a 12 – 18" piece of yarn. The girl begins winding the yarn around her finger while she is talking. Her turn is over when the string is wound

OPTIONAL:

Now that you have learned the Girl Scout Promise, each Daisy can now receive her Daisy Center patch. (All Daisy Center Patches & Petals are now sold as a set already to iron on)

Parent helpers Bring an iron and large towel to the meeting. (Put the towel on a table and heat the iron.) While leader starts with the main activity, one of the parent helpers can call each Daisy over one at a time. Have her remove her tunic. Let her place her tunic on the towel. Have her place the Daisy Center patch in the middle of the front of her tunic. The parent helper holds the hot iron on the Center patch as the Daisy counts to 20. Then have her flip the tunic over to the wrong side. You iron again as the Daisy counts to 20 again. This double ironing makes a very good bond.)

Activity Time

Daisy Activity Book

Complete the pages that have to do with the Girl Scout Promise, page 10 and 11, have the girls think of an example of how they will serve God and country and to help people. Then ask them to draw a picture of themselves doing these activities. On Page 9, have the girls draw the troop (see if they include you!)

(Note: If girls do not have the Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book, the same type of activities can be done on paper and assembled into a Daisy Girl Scout scrap book.)

A DAISY SONG (tune of ABC song)

**Daisy Girl Scouts lead the way, see us work and see us play
We can dance and we can sing, we can do most anything
We have fun and help each day, Daisy Girl Scouts here to stay!**

MIRROR GAME

In pairs, girls face each other and one repeats what the other does. Change roles, and then have girls find new partners.

Clean up

Pass around the trashcan to collect any trash. Have girls put their markers in the marker box and put away all of their supplies. Have the girls repeat after you. "A Girl Scout leaves a place better than she found it."

Closing

Recite the Daisy Poem or sing Make New Friends. End the meeting with a friendship circle

FOURTH MEETING

Pre-Meeting Activity

Me in Paper (page 10 of the Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders). Now that all of the details are complete, have each girl cut out her life size paper doll. When they are all cut out, roll them up until next meeting.

Opening

Begin with the Daisy Girl Scout Circle. Recite the Girl Scout Promise together. The Leader(s) read the girls The Girl Scout Law. Together, look at pages 14 & 15 of the Daisy Girl Scout Activity Book.

Troop Business/Talk time

HONEST AND FAIR

Remind the girls that each time they learn a part of the Girl Scout Law, they will earn a Daisy Learning Petal that will go around the Promise Center they received for learning the Girl Scout Promise.

Girl Scout Handshake. Introduce the Girl Scout Handshake. (Hold right hand up with the Girl Scout Sign and shake hands with the left hand). Explain that Girl Scouts all over the world use this greeting. Allow each girl to go around the Daisy Girl Scout circle and greet all troop members in this manner.

Activity Time

Talk about ways to be honest and fair. The best way to teach these concepts is by playing games. In the course of playing the games...throw in topics like sportsmanship, taking turns, friendship, and cheating.

Ask each girl to tell the group a time when she was honest and fair. If the girls are having trouble coming up with examples, ask: What would be the honest and fair thing to do if..

- you found a quarter on the floor at your best friend's house?
- If someone else wants a turn on the swing you have been on for a long time?
- Your little brother wants a second cookie and you have already had three?

Play a game where the girls take turns being the leader (Simon Says or Red Light Green Light). Be sure everyone has a turn to be the game leader. Talk about taking turns and being fair.

After everyone has demonstrated they understand **honest and fair**, tell the girls that they will receive the first learning petal, light blue for honest and fair.

Learn the Daisy Clean Up Song and one or two others.

Clean up

Start the Daisy Clean Up Song. Pass around the trashcan to collect any trash. Have girls put their markers in the marker box and put away all of their supplies. Have the girls repeat after you. "A Girl Scout leaves a place better than she found it."

Closing

End your meeting with a friendship circle.

FIFTH MEETING

Pre-Meeting Activity

Me in Paper (page 10 of the Guide for Daisy Girl Scout Leaders). Have each girl find her drawing from those that are already on the floor. Give each girl some tape and show her how to hang it up on the walls. Have the girl's guess which picture is which girl. When all of the girls are present, talk about the similarities and differences in people. Discuss favorite things: TV programs, storybooks, toys, foods, and places. Does looking different on the outside make us different on the inside?

Lead the girls in a discussion about the ways in which their Daisy troop is like a family, and the ways in which they can be like sisters to each other.

(Can you guess which Learning Petal your girls have completed? Be a Sister to Every Girl Scout!)

Opening

Girl Scout Promise – recite the Girl Scout Promise (by heart) all together in the Daisy Girl Scout Circle

Troop Business/Talk Time

Explain to the girls that at the next meeting will be a very special day for Daisy Girl Scouts. It will be the time when they receive their Daisy Girl Scout pin. There will be a special welcoming ceremony called Investiture. The girls will be able to invite their family and others to this special party.

Ask the girls which song they would like to sing for their guests. Are there any other plans the girls could help with (who to invite, how to arrange the room...)

Activity Time

Practice the ceremony and song you will use at the Investiture Ceremony

Make invitations for Investiture Ceremony. You can have pre-printed invitations that the girls can color and personalize with glitter, stickers, construction paper, etc. Be sure to include the date, time and place on your invitation.

Clean up

Begin the Daisy Girl Scout Clean Up song. Pass around the trashcan to collect any trash. Have girls put their markers in the marker box and put away all of their supplies. Have the girls repeat after you. "A Girl Scout leaves a place better than she found it."

Closing

Remind the girls to give the invitations to the Investiture Ceremony to their guests. End with the Friendship Circle.

Daisy Girl Scout Investiture Ceremony

Set Up: Enough chairs for each Daisy Girl Scout set in a horseshoe formation. (Girls are off stage in a group with one leader as the other begins.)

LEADER: Where are the girls who want to be Daisy Girl Scouts?

GIRLS: Here we are! (Daisy Girl Scouts walk in holding hands and take their places.)

LEADER: Daisy Girl Scouts are the youngest members of Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. They were named for the founder of Girl Scouting, Juliette Gordon Low. Juliette was born on Halloween, October 31, 1860 in Savannah, Georgia. Her uncle gave her the nickname Daisy when she was a baby. He looked at her one day and said, "I bet she is going to be a "Daisy"!"

We will now make our Girl Scout Promise together.

(Girls drop hands and make the Girl Scout sign and say the promise with their leaders.)

LEADER: Now we will sing a special Daisy song.

GIRLS: Sing DAISIES (to the tune of the ABC Song) or choose another one the girls enjoy).

Daisy Girl Scouts lead the way
See us work and see us play
We can dance and we can sing
We can do most anything
We have fun and help each day
Daisy Girl Scouts here to stay!

(Girls sit down after the song is finished.)

LEADER: Now you will be come Daisy Girl Scouts!

(The assistant leader leads the girls one by one to the leader who will pin the girls)

ASST.LEADER: This is _____. She is a new Daisy Girl Scout.

LEADER: Welcome to Girl Scouting, _____. Here is your Daisy Girl Scout pin.

ASST.LEADER: It is tradition in Girl Scouting that girls are invested with the pin upside down. It is to be turned upright by the first person for whom they do a "good deed".

(Girls join hands in a circle as they are pinned).

The Ceremony ends with another song or with the leader saying:

LEADER: We have our pins; we've sung our song
And we'll be friends this whole year long.

SIXTH MEETING

Pre-Meeting Activity

Me in Paper hang up the paper dolls all around the room. Have each girl put her good deed daisy around the neck of her life sized paper doll. Have one adult help the girls to arrange the chairs for the guests. Another adult can help the girls get arrange the refreshment table.

Opening

Girl Scout Leaders can welcome their guest and invite them to look around at the beautiful life sized paper dolls. .

Activity Time

Ask everyone to participate along with the girls as you read the Juliette Low story with actions

Use the investiture ceremony you practiced in meeting five to give out the pins to the new Daisy Girl Scouts. If you did not award the Promise Center and the two Petals (Honest and Fair) and (Sister to Every Girl Scout) you may award them now.

Refreshments

Serve refreshments and chat with the guests. Ask them how they can help your troop (helping at meetings, making phone calls, organizing car pools, planning field trips, etc.) R

Clean up

Begin the Daisy Girl Scout Clean Up song. Pass around the trashcan to collect any trash. Have the girls repeat after you. "A Girl Scout leaves a place better than she found it."

Closing

End with the Friendship Circle, include the guests in your circle.
